Exam Project

For your final assessment, you will be researching one of the 20th Century conflicts (see the provided list).

Part 1: Mapping the Conflict

- Situate on a world map (Ms Martin will provide) the country in which your chosen conflict took place.
- On a map of your country (Ms Martin will provide), identify key locations (cities, regions, etc)

Part 2: Timeline

- Create a timeline of your conflict, providing at least 10 key events.

Part 3: The Conflict

- Describe the situation and events that led to the beginning of the conflict.
- Evaluate the cost of the conflict and assess issues that still may cause contention today.
- Explain the various social and political reasons that underpin the conflict.
- Describe how the conflict started, how it unfolded, and how it came to an end.
- Highlight and explain the issues that had an impact on the country during and after the conflict.
- What were/are the short-term and long-term consequences of the conflict?

Part 4: The People

- Who was involved in the conflict? Why?
- What sides were there? Who were the aggressors? Who were the victims? Who were the bystanders?
- Who was involved in resolving the conflict? How?
- How many deaths were there? Civilians (who/why)? Non-civilians (who/why)?
- Who were the key players?

Part 5: Multimedia

Include at least 5 of the following:

- Quotes
- Images
- Video clips
- Charts
- Etc

Presentation

You will be signing up for an appointment during exam week to come in to present your project to Ms Martin. Aim for a 10-minute presentation where you will explain what you have found. You should not be reading directly from the screen, but using it as a support for your presentation.

In your final product, each of the five sections must appear. It is up to you to decide the order in which they are presented.
